President's Message: In Praise of Public Service



As I reflect on the recent passing of Mississauga's matriarch Hazel McCallion, and her 36 years as Mayor, it reminds me of how fortunate we are that we have people of her calibre who selflessly offer themselves to serve for the public good. Too often we want to live our lives for the simple benefit of our families, nothing more. We may join a church, a service club or a sports club involving our children. But how many of us are prepared to throw our hat into the ring for public office? Not too many, I suspect.

I think of Michael Bloomberg or Paul Martin or Erin O'Toole. All good men, independently wealthy and secure in their businesses and careers. Guest Speaker: Dr. John Chattoe Virtual and Augmented Reality

Last month's guest speaker was Dr. John Chattoe who joined us to share his broad knowledge on Virtual Reality (VR) and Augmented Reality (AR). John ,an engineer, worked for many years with Northern Telecom in marketing, and with General Dynamics on defense technology, the nature of which he couldn't share with us.

Using a number of slides and videos he walked us through the evolution of new technologies and the future applications for Virtual Reality (VR) and Augmented Reality (AR).

John began his presentation of VR by showing by video a victim of severe burn injuries. During the many skin grafts, skin stretching and other procedures, the victim was hooked up to VR head gear to permit him to play a video game involving snowballs and penguins. It had been demonstrated that the intellectual concentration of playing the game reduced measurably the pain related to the surgical procedures and rendered the patient calmer and more motivated.



He went on to talk about the adoption of technology by citing a 2015 Time magazine cover story on VR. The message was that the technology has yet to really take-off. As a comparison he noted that in the past 16 years, 2 billion I Phones have been sold. 1 billion are still in operation.

What is it? VR employs 3D simulation. It interacts with the individual in every sensory fashion; sight, sound, movement, touch and even smell. Research has been going on for 60 years and today we can find the technology in operating theaters, flight simulators and in the home.

AR is similar to VR in that it is computer based. Google Glass would be an example. That is 'glasses' which project images and text in the line of sight of the wearer providing her or him pertinent information as to what she/he is looking at. It can be used in training, medicine, design, manufacturing and retail.

John provided examples in surgical training, the treatment of PTSD, a furnishing app for IKEA and the manufacturing of Airbus aircraft. In each case the individual looks at a real object while additional objects, schematics and text are overlaid on the image. He noted that an aircraft could have a training manual of 5,000 pages. Using AR the technician sees only the data he needs for the parts that he is looking at.

Mass Adoption of Technology

John noted the criteria required for a mass adoption of a new technology, including:

- Technical performance
- Corporate Investment
- Advances required in software
- Market demand
- Human connectivity
- Must have effective content and pertinence

He described how Facebook (Meta) recently spent \$2 billion acquiring Oculus Rift, while Microsoft spent \$70 billion on Activision Blizzard. These companies are building the new Metaverse.

These ground-breaking technologies are creating new tools and techniques for Content Creation. Miniaturization and the increasing power of microchips are permitting infinitely more technology to be contained in smaller and smaller packages.

As no one could have guessed the penetration and rate of adoption of Cell Phones, the future for Virtual reality and Augmented Reality is yet to be defined. The Google Glass product introduced a few years ago has been taken off the market. Clunky and no 'killer' app. When the technology developers identify a need for this technology, be it in training, recreation, entertainment or medicine we can expect a geometric growth as we saw with PC's and laptops.

John Chattoe responded to many questions from our members, reflecting the high quality of his presentation and its pertinence for all of us.




Join us in Niagara-on-the Lake to enjoy this great musical



Book Club: Tuesdays With Morrie



Maybe it was a grandparent, or a teacher or a colleague. Someone older, patient and wise, who understood you when you were young and searching, and gave you sound advice to help you make your way through it. For Mitch Albom, that person was Morrie Schwartz, his college professor from nearly twenty years ago.

Maybe, like Mitch, you lost track of this mentor as you made your way, and the insights faded. Wouldn't you like to see that person again, ask the bigger questions that still haunt you?

Mitch Albom had that second chance. He rediscovered Morrie in the last months of the older man's life. Knowing he was dying of ALS - or motor neuron disease - Mitch visited Morrie in his study every Tuesday, just as they used to back in college. Their rekindled relationship turned into one final 'class': lessons in how to live.

The discussion was led by Bhushan Sennik who gave an overview of the book. Group comments included "I found the book to be profound and the book to be profound and "I am more Morrie rather than the author with whom we might have identified when we first

Current Affairs: Federalism, Is It Working In Canada?

On Tuesday morning February 21, the current affairs group had a lively discussion starting with China and its influence on the elections of 2019 and 2021. One of the participants felt that we, in Canada, need to understand the Chinese leadership better than we do. He stated that their priorities are:

To maintain an iron grip on the communist party

To manage their economy

Any real or potential threats, internal or external, as seen by the Chinese leadership, are dealt with as a priority. Hence their interference in our elections and their desire to get the Liberals elected in a minority government. Our concern, as a group, was why the Liberal government is so hesitant to deal with the Chinese interference. One suggestion was that we can learn from Singapore on how to better manage a relationship with the Chinese.

Our discussion then switched to looking at our federal government system. We identified the tension that exists between the federal government and the governments of the provinces and territories. Tension exists in the management of the health care system, balancing the care of the environment and natural resource extraction and the large inflow of refugees and immigrants, among many issues that currently face Canada. The provinces and territories are looking for increased funding and the Federal government is demanding more accountability.

One view brought forward is that our current system is reasonable with its checks and balances. The question was then asked on how we can improve on our current system. This provoked a number of comments and suggestions from our members.

- There is nothing wrong with our current system, it is the politicians that are the problem.
- How or where can we find another Hazel?
- We should get rid of the political parties and move to a presidential election.
- We should be moving towards more of a socialist system, even if we don't like it.

Fall Auto Tour to the Toyota plant in Cambridge

On Monday, September 18th, 25 Probians (including several spouses) met at Sheridan Centre Mall to renew acquaintances, car pool and set off for the Toyota plant in Cambridge. There were three groups, led by Ralph Cowell (with Roger Gibb navigating), Rick Cranston (with Kay navigating) and yours truly (with Pauline navigating). All the groups followed the same scenic, back roads route to the plant. We were pleased with the nice weather and no one got lost.



After checking in with Security, the Toyota tour started at the Experience Centre Showroom, and involved a motorized tram tour through the Assembly and Weld Shops in the North Plant, two of the most visually impressive shops in the plant. The North Plant assembles the Toyota RAV4 and the Lexus RH on a common production line that uses the "Toyota New Global Architecture" platform.

The people we talked to were obviously proud of the facility. There is an emphasis on safety, training,

continuous improvement and the goal is to send nothing to landfills. It is a non-union shop, working two shifts per day, five days per week. The whole plant is spotlessly clean. I was impressed by the driverless "tow motors" delivering parts, just in time, to the assembly line. I sat directly behind the driver of one of the two tour trams and noted how respectful and courteous he was. No more forklifts racing around at top speed.

After the tour there was a Q&A session that could have gone on much longer if we were not ushered out to make way for the next tour.
